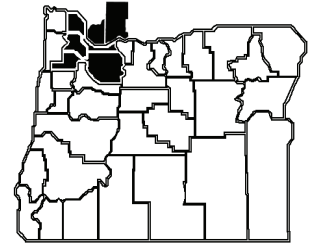

Employment Trends: Local

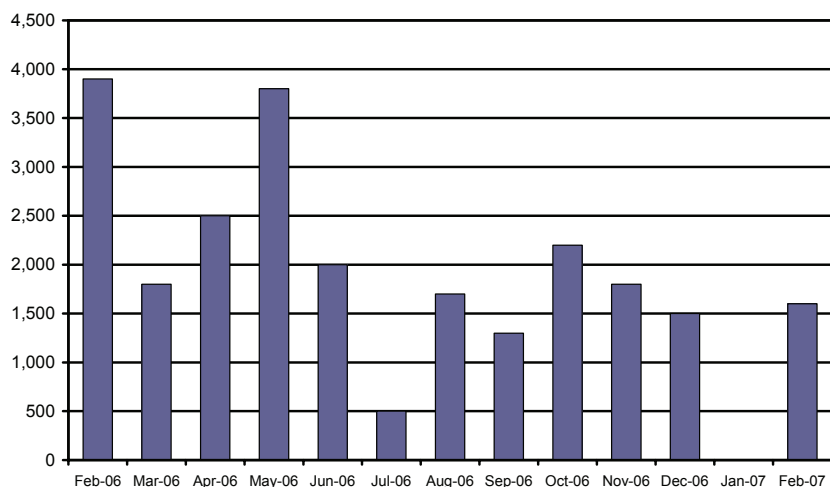
The Portland metro area's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.1 percent in February, unchanged from January. Oregon's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.3 percent in February, and the U.S. rate was 4.5. An estimated 64,300 metro area residents were unemployed and looking for work; down 1,800 from a year ago.

The metro area gained 1,600 nonfarm jobs in February on a seasonally adjusted basis, raising total employment to 1,026,800 jobs; up 20,700 (+2.1%) over a year ago.

Construction added 600 jobs over the month and 3,000 over the year. The pace of job growth slowed since last summer, yet it remains the fastest-growing broad industry in the metro area (+5.0% year-over-year).

Manufacturing added 300 jobs and is up 2,000 (+1.6%) over the year. High tech manufacturing slipped below year-ago levels while transportation equipment was flat over the year. Announced layoffs at Freightliner will lower employment levels by hundreds in

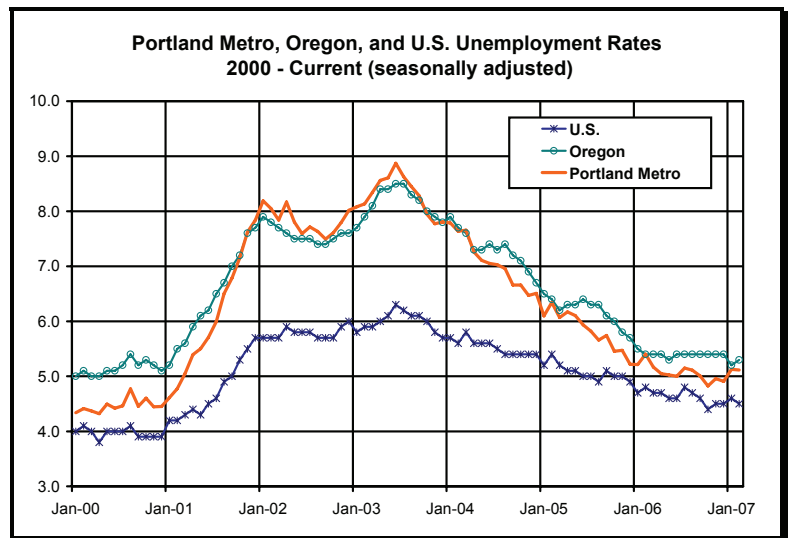
Portland Metro Area Monthly Nonfarm Job Growth

the coming months as the company shifts production to Mexico and elsewhere.

Professional and business services added 1,200 jobs as tax preparation agencies began gearing up for their busiest time of year. Leisure and hospitality added 600 jobs and is up 2,700 (+3.1%) over the year.

Trade, transportation, and utilities was the lone broad industry to post a loss, shedding 1,400 jobs as retailers finished their post-holiday layoffs. Total sector employment is up 4,100 jobs (+2.1%) over the year.



Employment Trends: State

Oregon's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.3 percent in February and 5.2 percent in January and remains close to levels seen throughout the past 14 months. In February, 118,381 Oregonians were unemployed, compared with 120,279 in February 2006.

Oregon's civilian labor force reached its highest February level ever at 1,916,368, up 42,964 from February 2006. In the seasonally adjusted series, the civilian labor force was at its all-time high.

Oregon's January unemployment rate ranked ninth highest of all states and the District of Columbia. Thus, although Oregon's rate is low compared to its recent history, many other states have even tighter labor markets.

Payroll employment rose substantially in February after a flat trend over the prior six months. Seasonally adjusted total nonfarm payroll employment rose by 7,000 in February after a revised decline of 500 in January (previously reported as a gain of 500). This was the largest monthly gain since December 2005 when 7,800 jobs were added. Strength in three industries – professional and business services (+3,500), trade, transportation, and utilities (+3,200), and construction (+900) – was partially offset by a decline in manufacturing (-1,900).

Seasonally adjusted manufacturing employment declined for the sixth consecutive month, reaching 201,900, which is down 7,300 jobs or 3.5 percent from its recent peak of 209,200 jobs in August. Much of this six-month decline was in durable goods manufacturing, where employment had been rising steadily in the two-year period ending in the summer of 2006, but now has fallen back due to job losses in wood product manufacturing, computer and electronic product manufacturing, and transportation equipment manufacturing.

Oregon grew slightly faster than the nation over the past year, 2 percent versus 1.5 percent, respectively. Nine of Oregon's 11 industry sectors grew between February 2006 and February 2007, but Oregon outpaced the nation in only six of them.

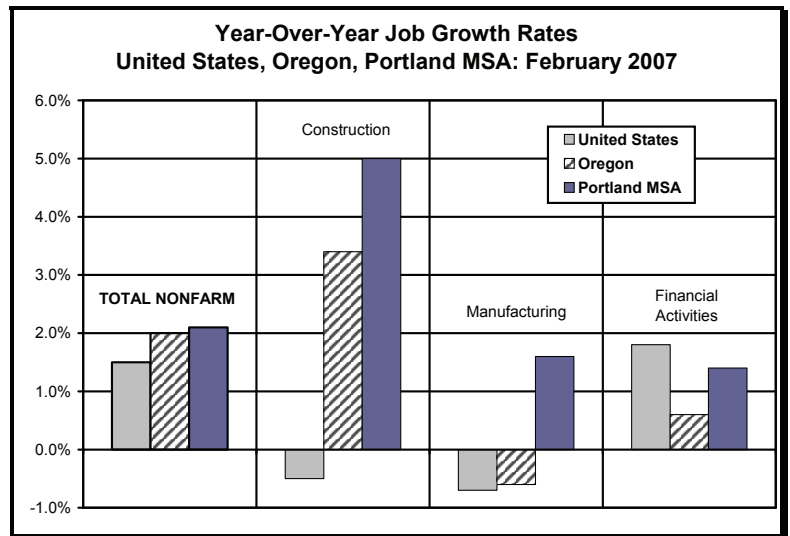
Employment Trends: National

In February, the number of unemployed persons (6.9 million) and the unemployment rate (4.5%) were essentially unchanged. The jobless rate remained within a narrow range – 4.4 to 4.6 percent – since September 2006.

Total payroll employment was up by 97,000, to 137.4 million, seasonally adjusted. This increase followed gains of 226,000 in December and 146,000 in January (as revised).

Health care employment rose by 33,000 in February, as job growth continued throughout the component industries.

Over the year, health care employment increased by 340,000.



Employment in professional and business services continued to trend up in February (+29,000) with small gains occurring in most of its component industries. Over the past 12 months, this industry added 460,000 jobs. In February, employment in services to buildings and dwellings grew by 11,000. Temporary help services employment was little changed over the month and over the year.

Food services and drinking places added 21,000 jobs in February. Over the year, food services employment rose by 348,000. Employment in the information industry was up by 13,000 in February. Within financial activities, depository credit intermediation added 4,000 jobs. Over the month, employment was essentially unchanged in both wholesale and retail trade. Air transportation lost 7,000 jobs.

Construction employment fell by 62,000 in February after posting a gain of 28,000 in January. Unusually severe winter weather conditions in some areas of the country in February likely contributed to job losses in the industry. Employment declined in both residential (-21,000) and nonresidential (-25,000) specialty trades, and heavy construction lost 10,000 jobs. Employment in residential specialty trades has been declining since February 2006.

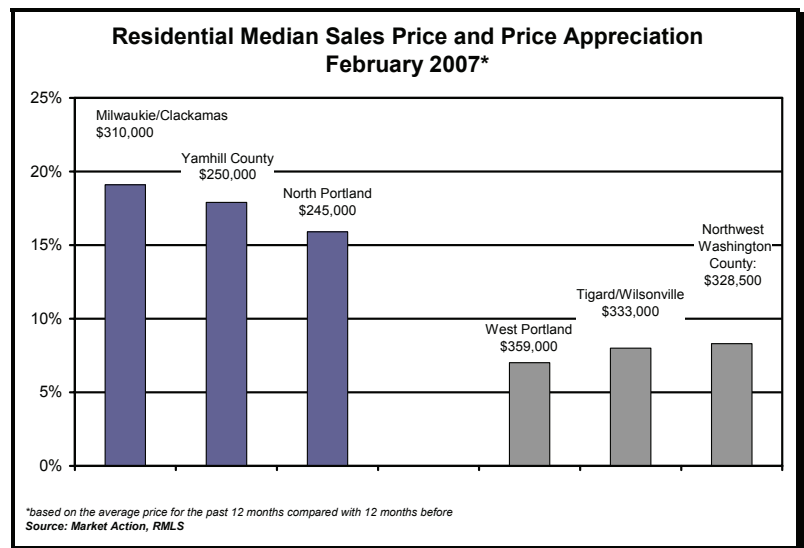
Manufacturing employment continued to trend down over the month (-14,000). Job losses occurred in wood products (-4,000), semiconductors and electronic components (-3,000), and textile mills (-3,000). Machinery added 5,000 jobs in February. In mining, employment rose by 4,000.

Snapshot: Portland Metro Home Sales in February

The Portland metro area's median sales price was \$279,000 in February 2007, up 5.9 percent over February 2006 according to *Market Action*, the Portland-based Regional Multiple Listing Service (RMLS) publication. The average sales price was \$326,700; up 6.3 percent over the year. [The median price –the midpoint– is a better indicator of trends since it is not as dramatically affected by a few excessively high or low figures, as is the average price.] Data does include the Washington State portion of the metro area.

Thus far in 2007, closed sales are down nearly eight percent compared to a year ago, while new listings are up almost 20 percent. The average number of days a house is on the market rose from 47 in February 2006 to 66 this past February. Inventory has climbed to a 5.2 month supply – one of the highest levels in years. During some periods over the past few years, inventories dipped as low as a 1.5-month supply.

RMLS breaks the metro area into 15 regions. Milwaukie/Clackamas, Yamhill County, and North Portland experienced the most rapid price appreciation. West Portland, Tigard/Wilsonville, and Northwest Washington County saw the slowest increases. However, the median prices in the rapidly appreciating areas were relatively low to begin with (about \$210,000), except in Milwaukie/Clackamas. Likewise, the areas with slower appreciation started out with relatively high prices (above \$300,000).

The Vancouver plant, which makes silicon ingots used to build solar wafers and employs 100, will be closed. *Portland Business Journal, 3-1-07*
- A four-story 100 plus unit **Phoenix Grand Hotel** will be built at the site of the former Bridgeport Value Inn in Tualatin. The site will also include 45,000 square feet of high-end retail. Employed includes nonfarm payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.
