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Employment in Tillamook County: April 2018

Employment Up 120 Jobs Over the Past Year

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment dipped by 10 in April to 9,230 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 210 jobs was expected for the month, but the county added only 200 jobs. The private sector grew by 170 jobs, and government employment rose by 30. Leisure and hospitality added 100 jobs, and food manufacturing grew by 50. Retail trade added 30 jobs over the month. Other industries had smaller changes.

April's total nonfarm employment was 120 more than one year before, a gain of 1.3 percent. The private sector added 190 jobs, and government lost 70. Industries adding the most jobs over the year were food manufacturing (+80) and leisure and hospitality (+40). Financial activities lost 40 jobs.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.3 percent in April, unchanged from the previous month (4.3%) and the year before (4.1%). It was essentially the same as the statewide rate (4.1%) and the national rate (3.9%).

The Oregon Employment Department plans to release the May county and metropolitan area unemployment rates on Tuesday, June 19, and the statewide unemployment rate and employment survey data for May on Tuesday, June 12.

Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
