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Employment in Tillamook County: October 2018

Expected Employment Little Changed in October

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment dipped by 10 jobs in October to 9,130 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A loss of 130 jobs was expected for the month, but the county shed 140. The private sector cut 240 jobs, and government employment rose by 100. Leisure and hospitality cut 160 jobs. Local government education added 100 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

October's total nonfarm employment was 20 more than one year before, a gain of 0.2 percent. The private sector added 130 jobs, and government lost 110 jobs. Food manufacturing added 80 jobs over the year but professional and business services cut 40 jobs. Local government excluding education shed 50 jobs over the year. About 80 jobs were reclassified from state government to private-sector education and health services.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.4 percent in October, essentially unchanged from the previous month (4.2%) and the year before (4.3%). It also was slightly higher than the statewide rate (3.8%) and the national rate (3.7%).

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
