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Employment in Tillamook County: January 2019

Employment Was Steady, in Line with Seasonal Expectations, in January

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment was unchanged in January at 9,340 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A loss of 100 jobs was expected for the month, and that was what happened. The private sector cut all 100 jobs, and government employment was unchanged. Leisure and hospitality cut 40 jobs and so did trade, transportation, and utilities. Other industries had smaller changes.

January's total nonfarm employment was 210 more than one year before, a gain of 2.4 percent. The private sector added 200 jobs, and government gained 10 jobs. Food manufacturing added 210 jobs over the year and private education and health services grew by 50. Professional and business services cut 70 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7 percent in January, essentially unchanged from the previous month (4.6%) and the year before (4.2%). It was about the same as the statewide rate (4.3%) and slightly above the national rate (4.0%).

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
