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Employment in Tillamook County: March 2019

Employment Rose by 10 more than Expected in March

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment rose by 10 in March to 9,330 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 50 jobs was expected for the month, but the county added 60. Total private-sector employment accounted for all 60 jobs, and government employment was unchanged. Leisure and hospitality added 60 jobs and other industries had smaller changes.

March's total nonfarm employment was 130 more than one year before, a gain of 1.5 percent. The private sector added 80 jobs, and government gained 50 jobs. Food manufacturing added 200 jobs over the year, but professional and business services lost 90 jobs. Local government education grew by 30 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.6 percent in March, essentially unchanged from the previous month (4.7%) but slightly higher than the year before (4.3%). It was about the same as the statewide rate (4.4%) but above the national rate (3.8%).

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
