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## **Employment in Tillamook County: June 2019**

### **Employment Slid by 30 more than Expected in June**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 30 in June to 9,510 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 220 jobs was expected for the month, but the county added only 190. Private-sector employment increased by 160 jobs, and government employment rose by 30. Leisure and hospitality added 140 jobs, and state government chipped in 30 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

June's total nonfarm employment was 240 more than one year before, a gain of 2.5 percent. The private sector added 120 jobs over the year, and government gained 120 jobs. Food manufacturing added 150 jobs over the year, and leisure and hospitality grew by 130 jobs. Professional and business services lost 60 jobs. State government grew by 70 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.2 percent in June. It was unchanged from the previous month (4.2%), and it was essentially the same as the year before (4.3%). It was about the same as the statewide rate (4.1%) but above the national rate (3.7%).

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
