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Employment in Tillamook County: July 2019

Expected Employment Unchanged in July

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment was unchanged in July at 9,530 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 100 jobs was expected for the month, and the county did add 100. Private-sector employment increased by 200 jobs, and government employment slid by 100. Leisure and hospitality added 160 jobs, but local government education cut 100 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

July's total nonfarm employment was 200 more than one year before, a gain of 2.1 percent. The private sector added 10 jobs over the year, and government gained 190 jobs. Leisure and hospitality added 50 jobs over the year. State government added 70 jobs and local government education grew by 60 jobs over the year, and local government excluding education added 50 jobs.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.1 percent in July. It was essentially unchanged from the previous month (4.2%), and the year before (4.3%). It was about the same as the statewide rate (4.0%) and the national rate (3.7%).

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
