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## **Employment in Tillamook County: October 2019**

### **Employment slid by 30 more than expected in October**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment slid by 30 in October to 9,560 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A loss of 150 was expected for the month, but the county lost 180 jobs. Private-sector employment decreased by 260 jobs, and government employment rose by 80. Leisure and hospitality eliminated 160 jobs over the month and food manufacturing cut 50. Local government education add 100 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

October's total nonfarm employment was 80 more than one year before, a gain of 0.8 percent. The private sector added 30 jobs over the year, and government gained 50 jobs. Local government education and state government each grew by 40 jobs over the year, and retail trade, financial activities, and professional and business services each added 30 jobs. Food manufacturing lost 60 jobs over the year and local government excluding education shed 50.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.2 percent in October. It was unchanged from the previous month (4.2%) and essentially unchanged from the year before (4.5%). It was about the same as the statewide rate (4.1%) but a little higher than the national rate (3.6%).

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
