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Employment in Tillamook County: October 2020

Seasonally adjusted employment unchanged in October

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment was unchanged in October at 8,670 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to drop by 130 jobs and that's what happened. The private sector lost all 130 jobs, and net government employment was unchanged. Leisure and hospitality cut 80 jobs. Local government education added 30 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

October's total nonfarm employment numbers show a loss of 810 jobs compared with one year before, a decrease of 8.5 percent. Nearly every major industry lost jobs over the year. Leisure and hospitality shed many of the jobs; the industry was down 210 jobs over the year, a drop of 13.8 percent.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped from the previous month. It was 6.7 percent in October and 8.1 percent in September. It was 3.4 percent the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 6.9 percent in October, and the national rate was 6.9 percent.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
