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Employment in Tillamook County: July 2021

Seasonally adjusted employment dipped by 10 in July

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 10 in July to 9,290 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to grow by 90 jobs, but the county added only 80 jobs. The private sector added 260 jobs, and government employment fell by 180. Leisure and hospitality increased by 150 jobs. Food manufacturing added 40 jobs. Local government education shed 160 jobs during the summer break. Other industries had smaller changes.

July's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 810 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 9.2%. The county lost 1,370 jobs in April 2020 as the pandemic hit, and it remains 250 jobs below its pre-pandemic employment of July 2019. Nearly every major industry gained jobs over the past year. Leisure and hospitality regained 280 jobs. Manufacturing added back 150 jobs, and retail trade recovered 50 jobs. Local government education regained 120 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.8% in July, essentially unchanged from 6.1% in June. It was 10.3% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 5.2% in July, and the national rate was 5.4%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
