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Employment in Tillamook County: December 2021

Seasonally adjusted employment rose by 30 in December

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 30 in December to 9,420 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to fall by 130 jobs, but the county lost only 100 jobs. The private sector shed 70 jobs, and government employment fell by 30. Leisure and hospitality cut 40 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

December's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 330 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 3.7%. The county lost 1,370 jobs in April 2020 as the pandemic hit, and it remains 190 jobs below its pre-pandemic employment of December 2019. About half of the major industries gained jobs over the past year. Leisure and hospitality regained 170 jobs. Manufacturing added back 70 jobs, and retail trade grew by 40 jobs. Local government education regained 60 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.3% in December, essentially unchanged from 4.5% in November. It was 6.0% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.1% in December, and the national rate was 3.9%.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
