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Employment in Yamhill County: June 2021

Yamhill County's Unemployment Rate Decreases to 5.4%

Yamhill County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.4% in June, down slightly from its revised rate of 5.6% in May. Oregon's statewide unemployment rate in June was 5.6%, down from its revised May rate of 5.8%.

Yamhill County's employment losses in June were smaller than normal; total nonfarm employment decreased 310 jobs, when an employment loss of 510 jobs would be expected. As a result, seasonally adjusted employment increased by 200 jobs between May and June. Employment remains 5.2%, or 1,820 jobs, below the level in February 2020, after sharp job losses in the spring of 2020.

Manufacturing (+80 jobs, 1.3%), construction (+50, 2.2%), and leisure and hospitality (+50, 1.6%) were the three industries in the private sector showing the largest employment gains in June.

Private educational services (-420 jobs, -20.7%) was the only industry with large employment losses in June as the school year wrapped up for the universities.

Yamhill County's public sector shed 70 jobs in June. Local government employment declined 70 while state and federal government employment was unchanged in June.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence.

Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants.

Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
