

## Help Wanted in Oregon

## Oregon businesses reported 62,800 vacancies in summer 2019.

Total job openings were essentially unchanged (-1%) from summer 2018.


A typical job vacancy tends to be for a full-time, permanent position.



## The labor market remains tight in Oregon and across the U.S.

### U.S. and Oregon Have Few Unemployed Workers per Vacancy

Oregon and the U.S. have both had a 1-to-1 ratio of unemployed persons to job openings for three consecutive summers.

Private health care and social assistance accounted for one out of every five job vacancies in Oregon during spring 2019.


Hiring remained broad-based across the economy, with at least 2,000 vacancies in all but two relatively small private industry sectors.

## The majority of job vacancies are reported as difficult to fill.

#### Businesses Report Difficulty Filling Six of 10 Vacancies in 2019



In a long economic expansion with almost three years at or near record low unemployment rates, the most common reason employers cite for difficulty filling vacancies is a lack of applicants.



## The starting wage for job vacancies averaged \$17.95 per hour in summer.

Inflation-adjusted average starting wages rose by about \$1 per hour between summer 2018 and 2019.

Over the year, the only increase in job vacancies by education requirement was for openings requiring at least a bachelor's degree (+400).
