


Northwest Oregon Industry Projections (2024-2034) Benton, Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln, and Tillamook Counties


Local Area Unemployment Rate (Preliminary Estimates, Seasonally Adjusted)

■ Dec-2024 ■ Dec-2025



Graph of the Month

Industry employment in Northwest Oregon is projected to grow by 5% between 2024 and 2034, adding approximately 5,900 jobs. Most industries are expected to see employment gains over the projected period, with the exception of manufacturing and mining, logging, and natural resources. Regional growth mirrors statewide trends, led to private education and health services and professional and businesses services, both projected to grow 12%.

Key Takeaways

Seasonally adjusted unemployment rates increased over the year across all five counties in Northwest Oregon. Employment grew in Clatsop and Tillamook counties, while Benton, Columbia, and Lincoln counties experienced over-the-year job losses. Several industries added jobs over the year, with local government and private education and health services showing consistent jobs added. In contrast, professional and business services declined in four out of five counties.
