# HELP WANTED IN OREGON RESULTS FROM THE WINTER 2025 JOB VACANCY SURVEY

### OREGON BUSINESSES REPORTED 51,300 VACANCIES IN WINTER 2025, THE LOWEST WINTER SINCE 2020.

Oregon businesses reported 51,300 vacancies in winter 2025. Vacancies increased 3% from the fall and decreased 15% from winter 2024. Employers reported difficulty filling 54% of winter 2025 vacancies.


The average starting wage among this group of vacancies was \$25.38 per hour, an inflation-adjusted increase of 6% from winter 2024, and a 5% decrease from fall 2024.

Characteristics of Oregon job vacancies were consistent with prior quarters. A typical job vacancy tends to be for a full-time, permanent position.



### WINTER UNEMPLOYMENT ROSE MORE THAN VACANCIES IN OREGON, CAUSING A MORE PRONOUNCED INCREASE TO THE UNEMPLOYED TO JOB VACANCY RATIO.

#### U.S. and Oregon Unemployed to Job Vacancy Ratios Rising After Record Lows



The U.S. ratio was around 1.0 in January 2025. It reached 5.0 in April 2020 after several years around 1-to-1.

Oregon had 2.3 unemployed per job vacancy in winter 2025, the highest level since winter 2021, but still much lower than the peak of 5.7 in May 2020.

Health care and social assistance represented 30% of all vacancies, with 15,500. Retail trade had 5,900 and leisure and hospitality had 5,400.


The average starting wage among this group of vacancies was around \$25.38 per hour, an inflation-adjusted increase of 6% from winter 2024, and a 5% decrease from fall 2024.

The number of vacancies offering a starting wage below \$20 per hour decreased 24% over the year. The number of vacancies offering between \$20 and \$30 per hour rose 2%, and vacancies paying above \$30 per hour decreased 6%.
