Employment in Clatsop County: December 2025

Clatsop County Unemployment Rate was 5.3% in December

Clatsop County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.3% in December, down from 5.4% in November, and above the rate of 4.3% in December 2024. The statewide unemployment rate was 5.2% in December, and the national rate was 4.4%.

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 10 in December to 19,600 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A decrease of 290 jobs was expected for the month, and the county lost 280 jobs. The private sector lost 230 jobs while total government employment decreased by 50. Leisure and hospitality lost 170 jobs. Nondurable goods manufacturing lost 60 jobs. Local government lost 50 jobs.

December's total nonfarm employment was up from the previous year by 90 jobs (+0.5%). Some major industries gained jobs over the past year, but others have plateaued or shed jobs. Nondurable goods manufacturing had the largest gain, adding 180 jobs over the year (+13.6%). Private education and health services added 70 jobs (+2.5%). The largest decline was in trade, transportation, and utilities, which lost 50 jobs (-1.1%). Local government lost 40 jobs (-1.8%).

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
