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## **Employment in Columbia County: September 2025**

### **Seasonally adjusted employment increased by 50 in September**

Today, the Oregon Employment Department released monthly employment and unemployment data for September 2025 in Columbia County, after a significant delay due to the federal government shutdown.

Columbia County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.9% in September, up from 5.7% in August. It was 4.7% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 5.2% in September, and the national rate was 4.4%.

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 50 in September to 12,320 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 180 jobs was expected for the month, and the county's payroll employment increased by 230. Private sector employment increased by 20, and government employment increased by 210. Trade, transportation, and utilities added 40 jobs. Local education added 220 jobs.

September's total nonfarm employment was up from the previous year by 240 jobs, an increase of 2.0%. Some broad sectors gained jobs over the past year. The largest gain occurred in private education and health services, which added 190 jobs. Retail trade was down 50 jobs over the year. Local education was up 60 jobs over the year.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
