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Employment in Eastern Oregon: June 2025

The June seasonally adjusted unemployment rates increased in all six Eastern Oregon counties. Harney and Wallowa counties' June 2025 rates were their third lowest June rates since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Baker County, it was the fourth lowest June rate. The seasonally adjusted rate moved 0.1 percentage point higher in Harney County to reach 4.6% for the smallest increase. The largest increase came in Union County where the seasonally adjusted rate rose 0.9 percentage point to reach 5.5%.

Between June 2024 and June 2025, unadjusted unemployment rates increased in all six Eastern Oregon counties. Harney County's June 2025 unadjusted rate is its fourth lowest unadjusted June unemployment rate since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Baker County, the June 2025 rate ties for its fifth lowest June rate. Harney County's raw rate rose by 0.4 percentage point to reach 4.3% for the smallest increase. The largest increase came in Wallowa County, where the raw rate increased by 1.4 percentage points to reach 5.0%.

Baker County's nonfarm payroll employment has increased by 50 jobs since June 2024. Employment increased by 40 jobs in the private sector and added 10 jobs in the public sector. Construction led gains, up 40 jobs. Manufacturing and financial activities led losses, down 20 jobs each. Total nonfarm employment increased by 30 jobs over the month led by a gain of 20 jobs in leisure and hospitality. Local government led losses, down 20 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.2 percentage point over the month to 5.1%. The raw unemployment rate rose by 0.6 percentage point to 5.2%.

Grant County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 70 jobs over the year. The private sector added 30 jobs while the public sector increased by 40. State government added 50 jobs to lead gains, followed by construction, up 40. Manufacturing dropped 40 jobs to lead losses, followed by professional and business services, down 20. Over the month, total nonfarm employment increased by 70 jobs. Mining and logging, leisure and hospitality, federal government, and state government added 20 jobs each to lead gains. Losses were confined to professional and business services, and private education and health services, down 10 each. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.2 percentage point over the month to 6.7%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 0.5 percentage point to 6.2%.

Harney County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 30 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 20 jobs, and the public sector cut 10. Losses were led by retail trade and federal government, down 30 jobs each. Gains were led by private education and health services, and local government, up 20 jobs each. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 60 jobs over the month, led by a loss of 70 jobs in local government. Goods-producing and federal government each added 10 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.6%. The raw unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percentage point to 4.3%.

Malheur County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 210 jobs over the year. The private sector rose by 10, and the public sector added 200 jobs. Local government added 140 jobs to lead gains, followed by gains of 80 jobs in private education and health services and 60 in manufacturing. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities led losses, down 40 jobs. Total nonfarm employment increased by 80 jobs over the month, led by a gain of 40 jobs in local government. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 1.2 percentage points to 5.3%.

Union County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 30 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 90 jobs, and the public sector increased by 60 jobs. Retail trade dropped 60 jobs to lead losses, followed by leisure and hospitality, down 50. Private education and health services led gains, up 90 jobs. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 10 jobs over the month, with local government and private education and health services leading losses, down 60 and 40 jobs, respectively. Construction led gains, up 30. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 5.5%. The raw unemployment rate rose by 0.5 percentage point to 5.6%.

Wallowa County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 10 jobs from June 2024 to June 2025. The private sector dropped 50 jobs, and the public sector increased by 60. Local government led gains, up 60 jobs. Transportation, warehousing, and utilities led losses, down 40. Total nonfarm employment increased by 130 jobs over the month led by a gain of 90 jobs in leisure and hospitality. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose by 0.2 percentage point over the month to 5.3%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 0.2 percentage point to 5.0%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
