Employment in Albany MSA (Linn County): April 2025

Linn County's Employment Grows

Linn County's employment gains in April were more than normal; total nonfarm employment increased by 170 jobs, when employment would be expected to increase 20 jobs. As a result, seasonally adjusted employment increased by 150 jobs between March and April. Employment is now 3.3%, or 1,540 jobs, above the pre-pandemic employment level in February 2020.

Linn County's seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment was up 1,010 (+2.1%) over the past year.

Private-sector employment was up 180 in April. Industries showing the largest employment gains in April included construction (+70 jobs, +2.2%), manufacturing (+50 jobs, +0.6%), and retail trade (+50 jobs, +1.0%).

Public-sector employment was down 10 in April. Local government employment was down 20. Federal government employment was up 20 and state government employment was down 10 in April.

Linn County's unadjusted unemployment rate was 4.7% in April, down from its revised rate of 5.5% in March. Oregon's statewide unadjusted unemployment rate in April was 4.1%, down from its revised March rate of 5.2%.

Labor force statistics for Oregon metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) are produced by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. Through June 2025, seasonally adjusted data are not available for Oregon MSAs or other MSAs around the country. New MSA definitions resulting from the 2020 Census are being incorporated into the history of the data series back to 1990, as well as other updates to the processing of labor force estimates for substate areas. The most recent month is preliminary, the prior month is revised. Prepared in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed individuals 16 years and older by place of residence. Employed includes payroll employment, self-employed, unpaid family workers, domestics, agriculture, and labor disputants. Unemployment rate is calculated by dividing unemployed by civilian labor force.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Official Oregon Series. Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
