
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Employment in South Central Oregon: March 2025

Like last month, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose slightly in South Central Oregon, with marginal increases in both counties this March. Over the year, total nonfarm employment increased in Klamath County while decreasing in Lake County.

Klamath County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased slightly in March and is now 6.3%, up from a revised rate of 6.1% in February. In March 2024 the unemployment rate was lower at 5.8%.

Klamath County gained 150 jobs (+0.6%) in March, with the majority of gains taking place within mining, logging, and construction (+40 jobs), specifically in construction (+40 jobs). Smaller but notable job growth also occurred within professional and business services, private education and health services. and leisure and hospitality, all of which gained 20 jobs over the month. While employment within financial activities was unchanged over the month, all other major industries gained 10 jobs. Seasonally adjusted



employment levels in Klamath County are now 2.2% (+500 jobs) above levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County gained 50 jobs in the past year (+0.2%) with gains concentrated in private education and health services (+140 jobs); professional and business services (+50 jobs); construction (+40 jobs); financial activities (+30 jobs); and government (+30 jobs). Notable private-sector job losses over the past year were seen in leisure and hospitality (-130 jobs); trade, transportation, and utilities (-70 jobs); manufacturing (-20 jobs); other services (-10 jobs); and mining and logging (-10 jobs). All other industries saw little to no change over the month.

Lake County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased marginally from a revised rate of 5.2% in February to 5.4% in March – last March it was 5.0%. The unemployment rate was 4.2% in February 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Total nonfarm employment was unchanged from February to March. Marginal gains were seen within professional and business services (+10 jobs) and the public sector (+10 jobs), but these gains were offset by job losses within manufacturing (-10 jobs) and mining, logging, and construction (-10 jobs). All other industries saw little to no gains over the month. Seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment levels remain 200 jobs (-8.0%) below the pre-pandemic February 2020 employment levels, as of March.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment has declined by 70 jobs (-3.2%) since March 2024. Over the year, supersector losses were more widespread, primarily concentrated within the public sector (-30 jobs); manufacturing (-20 jobs); and trade, transportation, and utilities (-20 jobs). Smaller losses of 10 jobs each were also seen in other services and mining, logging, and construction. Gains were minimal, limited to leisure and hospitality (+10 jobs) and financial activities (+10 jobs each), while all other major industries experienced little to no growth over the year.

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Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
