
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## **Employment in South Central Oregon: May 2025**

Seasonally adjusted unemployment rates increased in both South Central counties this May, with a larger percentage point increase in Lake County. Both counties also saw total nonfarm unemployment increase over the month with smaller gains in Lake County.

**Klamath County:** The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate continued to increase slightly in May and is now 6.5%, up from a rate of 6.4% in April. In May 2024, the unemployment rate was 0.7 percentage point lower, at 5.8%.

Klamath County added 440 jobs in May, a +1.9% increase, with the largest gains occurring within leisure and hospitality (+150 jobs) and government (+110 jobs). Additional private-sector gains were seen in trade, transportation, and utilities (+60 jobs); mining, logging, and construction (+60 jobs); professional and business services (+50 jobs); and private education and health services (+10 jobs). All other industries saw little to no



change. As a result, total nonfarm employment for the month stood at 24,060.

Klamath County gained 100 jobs in the past year (+0.4%) with private-sector gains concentrated in leisure and hospitality (+150 jobs); financial activities (+40 jobs); other services (+40 jobs); and manufacturing (+20 jobs). While total public-sector employment grew throughout the year, adding 20 jobs, federal employment declined by 20 and local government employment by 10. Notable private-sector job losses over the past year were also seen in construction (-100 jobs); private education and health services (-30 jobs); trade, transportation, and utilities (-20 jobs); and information (-20 jobs). All other industries saw little to no change over the year.

<u>Lake County</u>: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased over the month of May, going from 5.4% in April to 5.8% in May – last year around this time it was 0.9 percentage point lower, at 4.9%. The unemployment rate was 4.2% in February 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Total nonfarm employment was little changed from April to May with an increase of 30 jobs over the month (+1.5%). Small private-sector gains were seen across leisure and hospitality; other services; and professional and business services, with each sector adding 10 jobs over the month. Losses were recorded in manufacturing and private education and health services (10 jobs each). All other industries saw little to no gains over the month. Seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment levels are 330 jobs (-13.8%) below the pre-pandemic April 2020 employment levels, as of May.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment has declined by 170 jobs (-7.5%) since May 2024. Over the year, supersector losses were primarily concentrated within the public sector (-90 jobs) but were also more widespread. Smaller yet noticeable declines occurred in leisure and hospitality; private education and health services; and manufacturing, with each losing 20 jobs over the year. Similarly, professional and business services; trade, transportation, and utilities; and construction lost 10 jobs. The only industry to gain jobs over the year ending in May was other services (+10 jobs). While public-sector employment is down 8.2% over the year ending in May 2025, losses were concentrated within local government employment (-90 jobs).

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

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The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
