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Employment in Tillamook County: March 2025

Seasonally adjusted employment unchanged in March

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment was unchanged in March at 9,730 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to increase by 60 jobs, and the county added 60 jobs, with a gain of 30 jobs in both the private sector and total government employment. Leisure and hospitality added 30 jobs. Local government, excluding educational services, added 30 jobs.

March's total nonfarm employment was up from the previous year by 200 jobs, an increase of 2.1%. Nondurable goods manufacturing had the largest gains, adding 70 jobs (5.8%) over the past year. Retail trade lost 20 jobs during the year, a decline of 1.8%. Local government excluding education added 100 jobs over the year (+12%).

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7% in March, up from a revised 4.6% in February. It was 4.3% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.6% in March, and the national rate was 4.2%.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
