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Employment in Tillamook County: April 2025

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 60 in April

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 60 in April to 9,580 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to increase by 130 jobs, and the county added 70 jobs, with a gain of 80 jobs in the private sector and a loss of 10 jobs in total government employment. Leisure and hospitality added 50 jobs. Local education lost 10 jobs.

April's total nonfarm employment was essentially unchanged from the previous year, down by 10 jobs. Most of the private sector was down from the previous year. The largest declines occurred in manufacturing and retail trade, which each lost 40 jobs (-2.5% and -3.6%, respectively). Local government excluding education added 60 jobs over the year (+7.1%).

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7% in April, unchanged from 4.7% in March. It was 4.2% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.7% in April, and the national rate was 4.2%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
