Employment in Tillamook County: June 2025

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 10 in June

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 10 in June to 9,620 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to increase by 220 jobs, and the county added 210 jobs, with a gain of 200 jobs in the private sector and a gain of 10 jobs in total government employment. Leisure and hospitality added 130 jobs. Manufacturing added 40 jobs. State government employment increased by 10.

June's total nonfarm employment was essentially unchanged from the previous year, down by 30 jobs. Most of the private sector was down from the previous year. The largest declines occurred in manufacturing and retail trade, which each lost 50 jobs (-2.9% and -4.3%, respectively). Local government excluding education added 40 jobs over the year (+4.5%).

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.0% in June, up from 4.9% in May. It was 4.2% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.9% in June, and the national rate was 4.1%.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
