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## **Employment in Tillamook County: August 2025**

### **Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 20 in August**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 20 in August to 9,560 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to remain at 9,580 jobs, and the county lost 20 jobs, with a loss of 30 jobs in the private sector and a gain of 10 jobs in total government employment. Most industries had minor changes over the month.

August's total nonfarm employment decreased from the previous year by 80 jobs (-0.8%). Nondurable goods manufacturing added 30 jobs (+2.3%). Construction lost 40 jobs (-9.3%). Local education lost 20 jobs over the year (-2.7%).

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.2% in August, up from 5.1% in July. It was 4.3% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 5.0% in August, and the national rate was 4.3%.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
