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Employment in Tillamook County: September 2025

Seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 50 in September

Today, the Oregon Employment Department released monthly employment and unemployment data for September 2025 in Tillamook County, after a significant delay due to the federal government shutdown.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.3% in September, up from 5.2% in August. It was 4.3% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 5.2% in September, and the national rate was 4.4%.

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 50 in September to 9,660 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to decrease by 120 jobs, and the county lost 170 jobs, with a loss of 190 jobs in the private sector and a gain of 20 jobs in total government employment. Leisure and hospitality lost the most jobs with a decline of 80 jobs (-4.7%). Local education added 30 jobs (+4.1%).

September's total nonfarm employment decreased from the previous year by 60 jobs (-0.6%). Nondurable goods manufacturing added 30 jobs (+2.3%). Professional and business services lost 50 jobs (-12.5%). Local government lost 30 jobs over the year (-1.8%).

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
