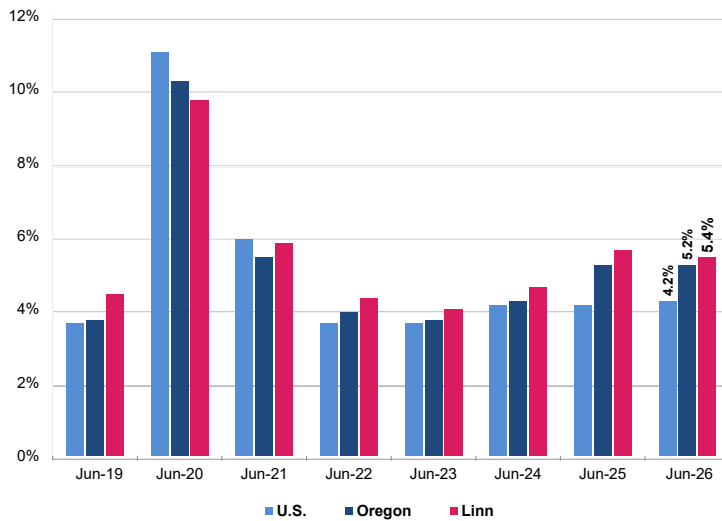


Linn County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.4% in June, unchanged from May's revised unemployment rate of 5.4%. Linn County's unemployment rate has decreased from 5.6% to 5.4% over the past year. Oregon's statewide unadjusted unemployment rate in June was 5.2%.

Employment in the county declined by 660 jobs (-1.4%) over the year. Employment increased in industries such as private education and health services (+350 jobs) and in construction (+40 jobs). Linn County saw declines in the trade, transportation, and utilities industry (-520 jobs) and in manufacturing (-170 jobs).

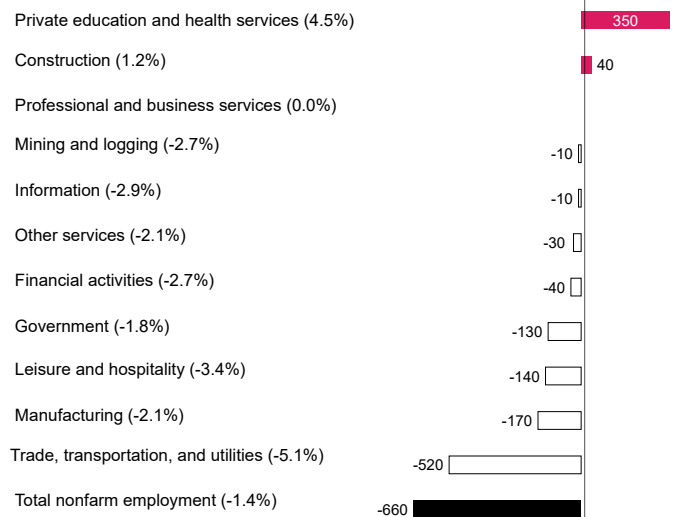
Industries with the Most Projected Openings – The table below lists the Mid-Valley industry projections from 2024-2034 in order of highest number of openings to least. What is interesting about the 10 industries with the highest number of openings, is that most of the industries are projected to grow slower than the Mid-Valley growth rate of 6%. Only four out of the ten industries listed will grow faster than the area average– health care and social assistance, accommodation and food services, construction, and administrative and support and waste management and remediation services. Additionally, two of industries on this list are expected to grow by 0% and will still need a considerable amount of workers to fill openings left either due to retirement or people switching occupations. Examining our projected openings helps ensure we plan to meet workforce needs as people move out of their respective industries and the workforce.

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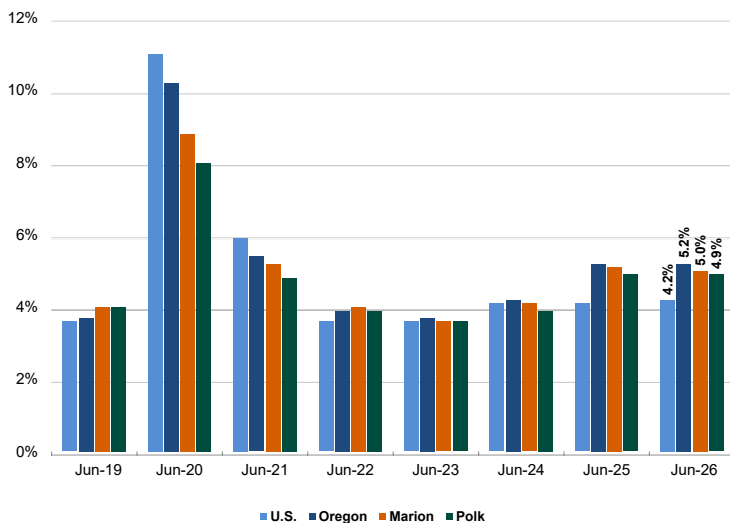
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The Salem MSA's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.9% in June, unchanged from May's revised unemployment rate of 4.9%. The Salem MSA's unemployment rate has been essentially unchanged, decreasing from 5.0% to 4.9% over the past year. Oregon's statewide seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in June was 5.2%.

Employment in the county increased by 3,200 jobs (+1.7%) over the year. Employment increased in industries such as trade, transportation, and utilities (+2,400 jobs); private education and health services (+1,200 jobs); and in the other services (+300 jobs). Salem MSA saw declines in manufacturing (-700 jobs), construction (-300 jobs), and in leisure and hospitality (-200 jobs).

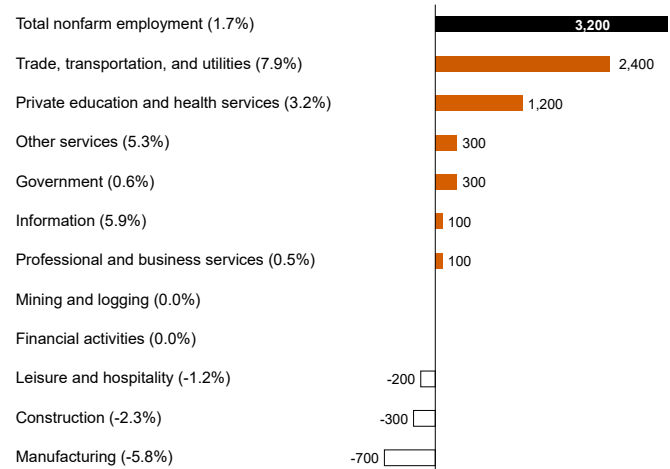

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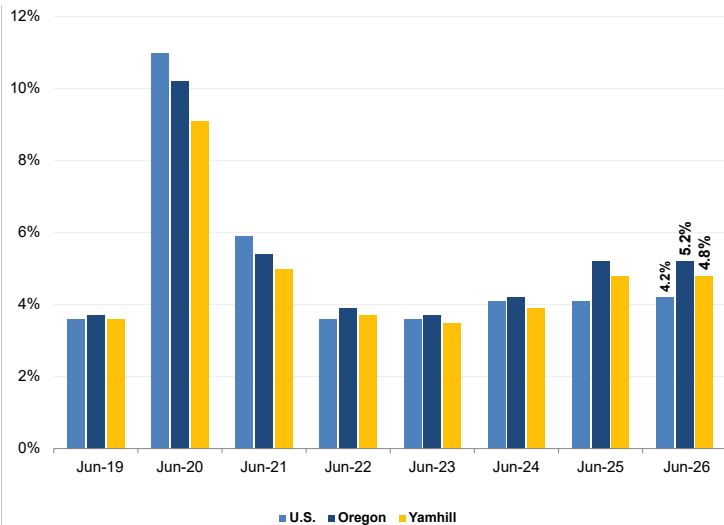
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Yamhill County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.8% in June, unchanged from May's revised rate of 4.8%. Yamhill County's unemployment rate was unchanged over the past year. Oregon's statewide unemployment rate in June was 5.2%. Oregon's unemployment rate was unchanged over the past year.

Employment in the county increased by 210 jobs (+0.6%) over the year. Employment increased in industries such as private education and health services (+460 jobs) and in professional and business services (+110 jobs). Yamhill County saw declines in the government industry (-130 jobs) and in financial activities (-100 jobs).

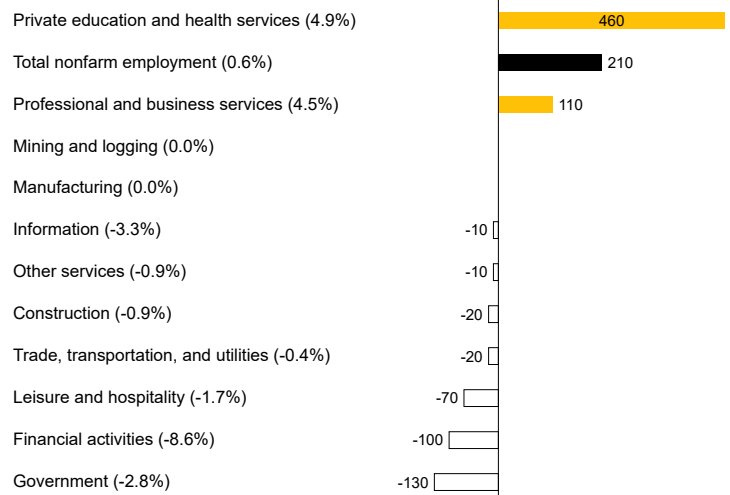
