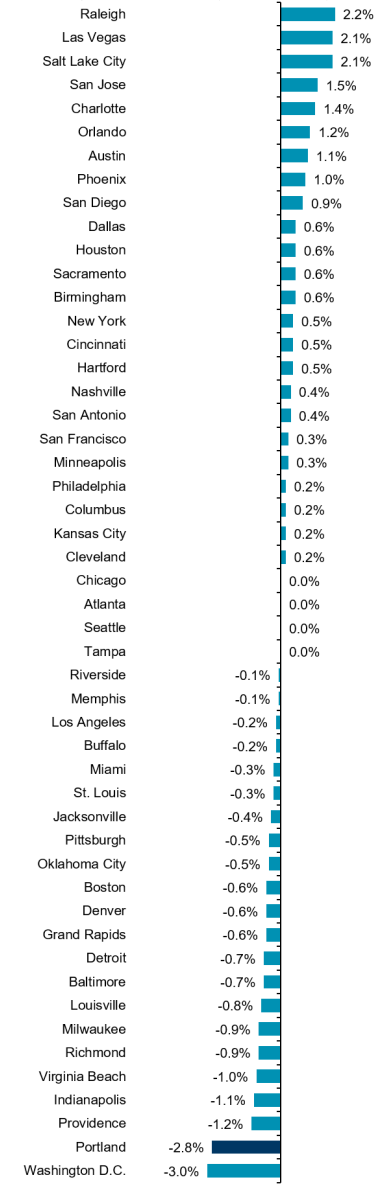
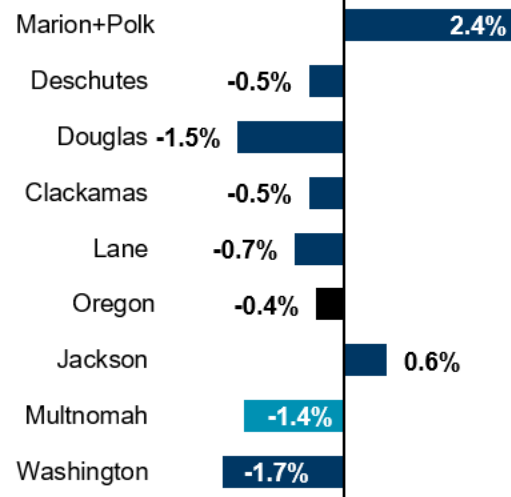


Job Growth by U.S. Metro
Percentage Growth — May 2025 to May 2026



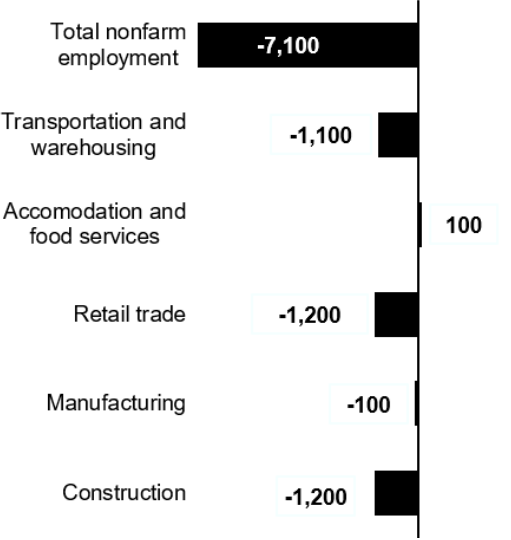

June 2025 to June 2026



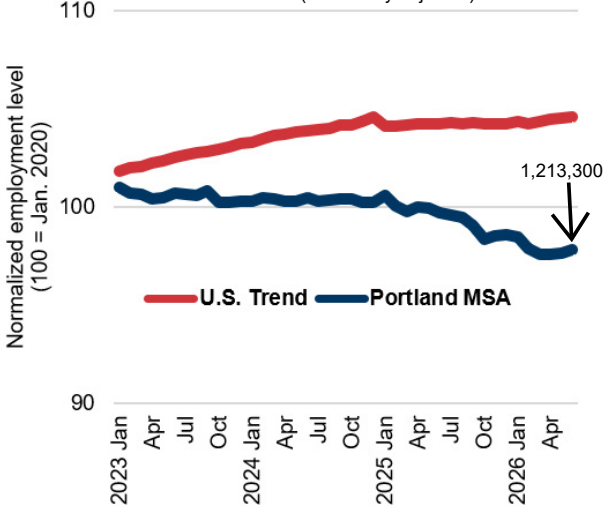

Multnomah County, June 2025 to June 2026



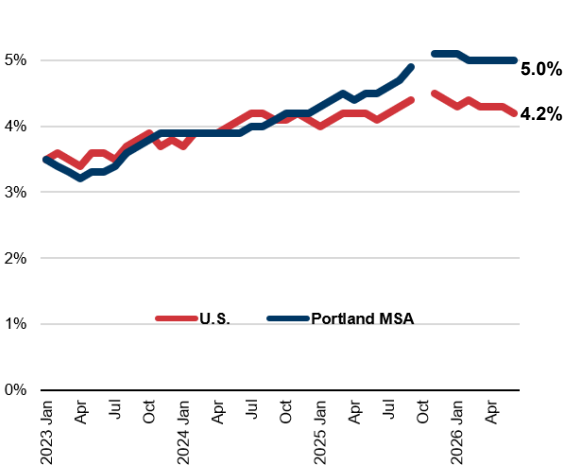

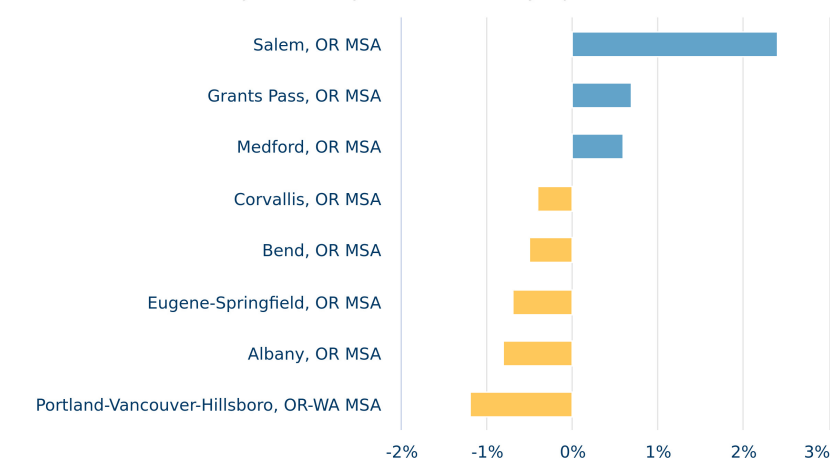
Unemployment Rate Portland Metro

A Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) is a region centered around an urban core with at least 50,000 residents. Oregon has eight MSAs: Portland-Vancouver-Hillsboro, Salem, Corvallis, Albany, Eugene-Springfield, Bend, Medford, and Grants Pass. Of these, Portland-Vancouver-Hillsboro is the only one with a population exceeding one million. Over the past year, employment trends differed widely across the state. Salem posted the strongest growth at 2.4%, followed by Grants Pass at 0.7% and Medford at 0.6%. Meanwhile, Portland-Vancouver-Hillsboro saw employment decline by 1.2%, Albany decreased by 0.8%, and Eugene-Springfield fell by 0.7%.
