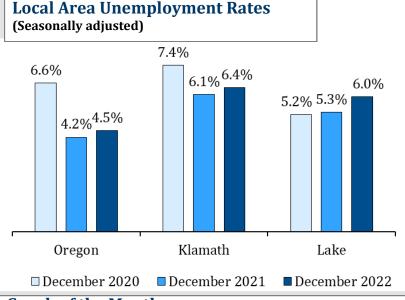

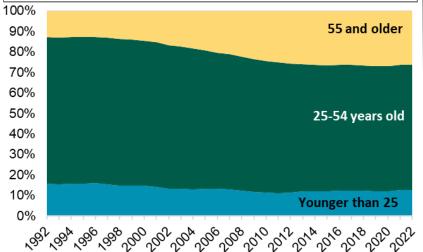

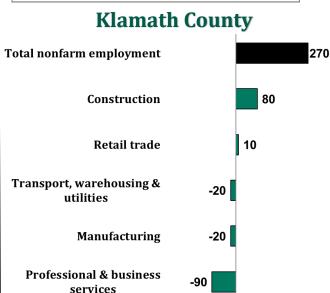
Graph of the Month Age of Employees Over Time in South Central Oregon Source: Census, Quarterly Workforce Indicators



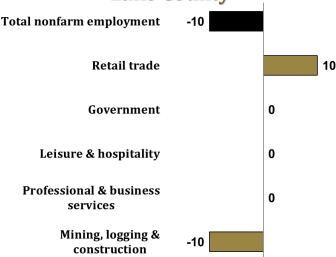
Roughly 26% of employees in Klamath and Lake counties were 55 years or older in 2022, according to the Census' Quarterly Workforce Indicators (QWI). This is 9 percentage points higher than in 2002 when only 17% of employees were 55 years or older. Employment share for people ages 54 or younger decreased significantly during the same time period. Employment share for people 25-54 years old declined from 70% to 61%; the share declined from 14% to 12% for those younger than 25.

This demographic shift in the workforce has been fueled by a few main reasons. The Great Recession (2007) decreased employment of people younger than 25 more than other age groups; boomers, the second largest generation, are aging; and the Oregon birthrate has slowed considerably since the late 1990s.
