



## Mid-Valley Economic Indicators— Linn County, December Data


Linn County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased slightly in December and is now 4.0%. Statewide, the unemployment rate increased to 3.7% from 3.6% in November. During this time, seasonally adjusted employment increased by 260 jobs, and employment is now 1,800 jobs, or 3.8% above the February 2020 pre-pandemic employment level.


From December of last year to December of this year, total nonfarm employment increased by 3.5%, or by 1,660 jobs. The public sector had the largest employment gains over the year (+1,050 jobs), followed by the private education and health services industry (+440 jobs). The trade, transportation, and utilities industry had the greatest employment losses (-160 jobs), followed by the information industry (-20 jobs).

**PROJECTED JOB GROWTH** — The fastest-growing jobs in most regions are dominated by health care. This is also true in the Mid-Valley, where healthcare support occupations are expected to grow by 20.4% by 2032. Personal care and service related jobs are expected to grow at the second-fastest rate during this time (16.6%), followed by construction and extraction jobs (15.6%). When considering all jobs, the rate of growth is smaller at 9.6%, but job growth within these broader occupational categories can vary widely. 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



## Mid-Valley Economic Indicators— Salem MSA, December Data


The Salem MSA's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.8% in December, up from 3.6% in November. Similarly, statewide, the unemployment rate increased from 3.6% in November to 3.7% in December. Seasonally adjusted employment was up by 700 jobs, and employment is now 5.5%, or 9,600 jobs, above the February 2020 pre-pandemic employment level.

Year-over-year, total nonfarm employment is up 2.3%, or 4,200 jobs. During this time, the private education and health services industry saw the largest employment gains (+2,300 jobs), followed by the leisure and hospitality industry (+900 jobs) and the professional and business services industry (+700 jobs). In contrast, employment in both the manufacturing industry and the trade, transportation, and utilities had the largest employment losses (-400 jobs each).

**PROJECTED JOB GROWTH** — The fastest-growing jobs in most regions are dominated by health care. This is also true in the Mid-Valley, where healthcare support occupations are expected to grow by 20.4% by 2032. Personal care and service related jobs are expected to grow at the second-fastest rate during this time (16.6%), followed by construction and extraction jobs (15.6%). When considering all jobs, the rate of growth is smaller at 9.6%, but job growth within these broader occupational categories can vary widely. 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
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
## Mid-Valley Economic Indicators— Yamhill County, December Data


Yamhill County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased slightly from 3.3% in November to 3.4% in December. Statewide, the unemployment rate increased from 3.6% in November to 3.7% in December, while the nation's was unchanged in December at 3.7%. The county's seasonally adjusted employment increased by 150 jobs during this time, and employment is now 1,280 jobs, or 3.6%, above the pre-pandemic employment level of February 2020.

Year-over-year, total nonfarm employment increased by 1.8%, or 650 jobs. The private education and health services industry gained the most jobs during this time (+760), followed by the public sector and other service (+40 jobs each). The manufacturing industry registered the most employment losses (-50 jobs), followed by the financial activities industry and the construction industry (-40 jobs each).

**PROJECTED JOB GROWTH** — The fastest-growing jobs in most regions are dominated by health care. This is also true in the Mid-Valley, where healthcare support occupations are expected to grow by 20.4% by 2032. Personal care and service related jobs are expected to grow at the second-fastest rate during this time (16.6%), followed by construction and extraction jobs (15.6%). When considering all jobs, the rate of growth is smaller at 9.6%, but job growth within these broader occupational categories can vary widely.
