




This month's map is a snapshot of workers' commuting patterns in Coos County during 2019. A total of 16,078 workers were employed in the county during 2019. Thirty percent or 4,695 workers traveled from outside Coos County to work and 70% or 11,383 workers both lived and worked in Coos. About 5,200 workers lived in Coos County but were employed outside.

Curry County employed a total of 4,794 workers in 2019, 34% which were employed in Curry County but lived outside, and 66% were both living and employed within Curry County.


Selected Industry <u>Gains</u> and <u>Losses</u> (Over-the-year net employment change)

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
