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Employment in Columbia County: April 2023

Seasonally adjusted employment was unchanged in April

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment was unchanged in April at 12,260 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. A gain of 30 jobs is normal for the month, and the county's payroll employment rose by 30. The private sector added 40 jobs, and government employment dipped by 10. Leisure and hospitality added 40 jobs. Other industries had smaller changes.

April's total nonfarm employment numbers showed a gain of 180 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 1.5%. Some major industries gained jobs over the past year. Leisure and hospitality added 110 jobs during the year. Other services added 60 jobs, and private education and health services was up 50 jobs over the year. Construction and manufacturing each shed 50 jobs. Local government education added 60 jobs compared with the year before.

Columbia County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.6% in April, essentially unchanged from 5.0% in March. It was 4.4% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.0% in April, and the national rate was 3.4%.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
