Employment in Eastern Oregon: December 2023 Eastern Oregon Unemployment Rates Reach December Lows

Between December 2022 and December 2023, unemployment rates decreased in all Eastern Oregon counties. In Grant, Harney, and Wallowa counties, the December 2023 rates are the lowest unadjusted December unemployment rates since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Baker, Malheur, and Union counties, they are the third lowest December rates behind only December 2019 and December 2021. The largest over-the-year decrease came in Grant and Wallowa counties where the raw rates dropped by 2.6 percentage points to reach 4.9% and 4.6%, respectively. The smallest decrease came in Union County, where the raw rate decreased by 1.0 percentage point to reach 4.4%.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased over the year in all six Eastern Oregon counties. In Baker, Grant, Harney, Union, and Wallowa counties, they are the lowest December rates since 1990. In Malheur County, the December 2023 rate ties with the December 2019 rate for the lowest December rate. The largest over-the-year decrease came in Grant County where the seasonally adjusted rate lowered by 2.2 percentage points to reach 4.7%. The smallest decrease came in Baker County where the seasonally adjusted rate dropped 1.3 percentage points to reach 4.1%. For Baker (4.1%), Grant (4.7%), Harney (3.9%), and Wallowa (4.1%) counties, the December 2023 seasonally adjusted unemployment rates represent not only the lowest December rates but the lowest rates for any month since 1990.

Baker County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 40 since December 2022. Employment decreased by 30 jobs in the private sector and increased by 70 jobs in the public sector. Local government led gains, up 90. The largest decrease came in leisure and hospitality, which was down 30; followed by transportation, warehousing, and utilities and state government, each dropping 20 jobs. Overall employment increased by 10 jobs over the month with private education and health services leading gains, up 20. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was unchanged over the month at 4.1%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 0.9 percentage point to 4.7%.

Grant County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 20 jobs over the year. The private sector saw a net change of zero jobs while the public sector increased by 20. Local government added 70 jobs and manufacturing rose by 20 to lead gains. State government led losses, down 30. Over the month, total employment dropped 40 jobs led by a loss in leisure and hospitality, down 20. The seasonally adjusted

unemployment rate dipped 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.7%. The raw unemployment rate climbed 0.9 percentage point to 4.9%.

Harney County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 50 jobs over the year. The private sector decreased by 70 jobs and the public sector added 20. Professional and business services led losses, down 50. Small gains were spread across industries. Total employment decreased by 10 jobs over the month, with small losses and small gains nearly balancing across industries. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was unchanged over the month at 3.9%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 0.8 percentage point to 4.5%.

Malheur County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 30 over the year. The private sector dropped by 190 and the public sector added 220 jobs. Local government added 160 to lead gains. Retail trade dropped 130 jobs to lead losses. Total employment decreased by 90 over the month, with retail trade, and transportation, warehousing, and utilities leading the losses, down 30 jobs each. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose 0.1 percentage point over the month to 3.6%. The raw unemployment rate rose 0.7 percentage point to 3.8%.

Union County's total nonfarm payroll employment increased by 110 jobs over the year. The private sector added 60 jobs and the public sector increased by 50. Manufacturing added 50 jobs and private education and health services added 40 to lead gains. Losses were led by transportation, warehousing, and utilities, down 40. Total employment decreased by 50 over the month, with construction leading losses, down 30. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose 0.1 percentage point over the month to 3.8%. The raw unemployment rate increased by 1.0 percentage point to 4.4%.

Wallowa County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 50 jobs from December 2022 to December 2023. The private sector added 20 jobs and the public sector increased by 30. Local government led gains, up 40 jobs. Losses were led by construction and manufacturing, each down 20. Total nonfarm employment decreased by 50 over the month, led by a loss of 20 jobs in leisure and hospitality. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dipped 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.1%. The raw unemployment rate climbed 0.8 percentage point to 4.6%.

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The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
