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Employment in Eastern Oregon: February 2024 Eastern Oregon Unemployment Rates Remain Low

The February seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased over the year in all six Eastern Oregon counties. In Grant, Malheur, Union, and Wallowa counties, they are the lowest February rates since comparable statistics began in 1990. In Baker and Harney counties, the February 2024 rates are the second lowest February rates behind February 2022. The largest over-the-year decrease came in Grant County where the seasonally adjusted rate moved 2.1 percentage points lower to reach 4.5%. The smallest decrease came in Baker County where the seasonally adjusted rate dropped 1.0 percentage point to reach 4.4%. For Grant County (4.5%), the February 2024 seasonally adjusted unemployment rate represents not only the lowest February rate but the lowest rate for any month since 1990.

Between February 2023 and February 2024, unadjusted unemployment rates decreased in Grant and Wallowa counties while increasing in Baker, Harney, Malheur, and Union counties. In Grant County, the February 2024 rate is the lowest unadjusted February unemployment rate since 1990. In Wallowa County, it is the second lowest February rate behind only February 2022. In Harney County, the only lower February rates were in 2022 and 2023. Baker, Malheur, and Union counties had lower February rates in 2020, 2022, and 2023. The largest over-the-year decrease came in Grant County where the raw rate dropped by 0.4 percentage point to reach 6.2%. The largest increase came in Union County, where the raw rate increased by 0.8 percentage point to reach 5.7%.

Baker County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 50 since February 2023. Employment decreased by 60 jobs in the private sector and increased by 110 jobs in the public sector. Local government led gains, up 100, with professional and business services adding 30. The largest decreases came in leisure and hospitality and construction, which were down 50 and 40 jobs, respectively. Overall employment increased by 30 jobs over the month with local government leading gains, up 20. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.4%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 0.3 percentage point to 5.9%.

Grant County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 70 jobs over the year. The private sector saw a net change of zero jobs while the public sector increased by 70. Local government added 70 jobs and construction rose by 30 to lead gains. Wholesale trade and retail trade led losses, each down 20. Over the month, total employment saw a net change of zero jobs with small losses offsetting small gains

across industries. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dipped 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.5%. The raw unemployment rate fell 0.8 percentage point to 6.2%.

Harney County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 10 jobs over the year. The private sector decreased by 30 jobs and the public sector added 20. Small losses were spread across industries. Gains were confined to local government and state government. Total employment increased by 30 jobs over the month, led by a gain in local government, up 30. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose 0.2 percentage point over the month to 4.2%. The raw unemployment rate was unchanged at 6.1%.

Malheur County's nonfarm payroll employment increased by 260 jobs over the year. The private sector dropped by 50 and the public sector added 310 jobs. Local government added 260 to lead gains. Retail trade dropped 100 jobs to lead losses. Total employment increased by 110 over the month, with local government leading the gains, up 60 jobs. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 3.7%. The raw unemployment rate dropped 0.4 percentage point to 4.6%.

Union County's total nonfarm payroll employment saw a net change of zero jobs over the year. The private sector dropped 30 jobs and the public sector increased by 30. Private education and health services added 50 jobs to lead gains and retail trade dropped 50 to lead losses. Total employment increased by 90 jobs over the month, with local government leading the way, up 50. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose 0.2 percentage point over the month to 4.1%. The raw unemployment rate decreased by 0.1 percentage point to 5.7%.

Wallowa County's nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 10 jobs from February 2023 to February 2024. The private sector dropped 20 jobs and the public sector increased by 10. Manufacturing and construction led losses, down 30 and 20 jobs, respectively. Gains were led by wholesale and retail trade, and private education and health services, each up 20. Total nonfarm employment increased by 20 over the month, with small gains in leisure and hospitality, other services, and local government overcoming a small loss in federal government. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased by 0.1 percentage point over the month to 4.2%. The raw unemployment rate was unchanged at 6.9%.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
