Employment in Jackson County: April 2023 Private Education and Health Services Added Most Jobs over the Year

Total payroll employment in Jackson County rose by 80 jobs in April. Private-sector gains were estimated in leisure and hospitality (+170), manufacturing (+100), private education and health services (+50), construction (+40), and other services (+40). Industries with job losses over the month included retail trade (-210); transportation, warehousing, and utilities (-40); and wholesale trade (-20). Government employment fell by 30 jobs in April with a decline in local government (-40) and a slight gain of 10 jobs in federal government.

Over the past year payroll employment in the Medford MSA (Jackson County) gained 830 jobs, an increase of 0.9%. Since April 2022, industries adding jobs included private education and health services (+1,150); leisure and hospitality (+350); other services (+130); construction (+60); and professional and business services (+30). In contrast, retail trade (-390); transportation, warehousing, and utilities (-160); financial activities (-70); manufacturing (-70); wholesale trade (-50); and information (-50) lost jobs over the year.

Government employment was little changed, down by 20 jobs over the year. Local government lost 160 jobs while gains were posted in state (+80) and federal government (+60). Jackson County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was estimated at 4.8% in April, down from 5.2% in March but up slightly over the year, rising from 4.1% in April 2022.

Notes:

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted. These preliminary estimates of jobs and other labor force data are produced in cooperation with the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics, are based largely on a survey of businesses and a survey of households, and are subject to later revision.
