
Employment in South Central Oregon: December 2023

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate saw little to no change in Klamath County and a slight increase in Lake County. An important note, these estimates are already in the process of annual benchmark revisions. A more detailed year-in-review will be available after the release of these revisions in March.

Klamath County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.9% in December, unchanged from 4.9% in November. The unemployment rate in December 2022 was 6.6%.

Klamath County lost 280 jobs (-1.2%) in December, with the majority of losses taking place in the public sector (-150 jobs). Seasonally adjusted employment levels in Klamath County are 2.8% (+640 jobs) above levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County added 570 jobs in the past year (+2.5%). Notable private-sector job gains over the past year were seen in private education and health services (+290 jobs);



other services (+70 jobs); and construction (+70 jobs). In the public sector, government employment was up by 260 jobs over the year, with the largest gains taking place in local government (+240 jobs). Total nonfarm employment growth was moderated by losses in trade, transportation, and utilities (-100 jobs) and manufacturing (-80 jobs).

Lake County: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased slightly in Lake County and is now 5.0% in December, up from a revised rate of 4.9% in November. The unemployment rate was 4.2% in January 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Lake County employment decreased by 30 jobs in December, smaller than normal losses for this time of year with the only notable monthly gains in private education and health services (+10 jobs). As of December 2023, seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment levels remain 120 jobs (-5.0%) below the pre-pandemic February 2020 employment levels.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment is down by 50 jobs over the year with the only notable gains in mining, logging, and construction (+20 jobs). These gains were overshadowed by losses in local government (-50 jobs); leisure and hospitality (-40 jobs); and manufacturing (-20 jobs). All other major industries saw little to no change over the year.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
