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
## **Employment in South Central Oregon: February 2024**

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased in Klamath County but remained unchanged in Lake County over the month of February.

**Klamath County:** The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased to 5.1% in February from 5.0% in January. The unemployment rate in February 2023 was 6.7%.

Klamath County gained 150 jobs (+0.6%) in February, with the majority of gains taking place in the public sector (+90 jobs). Seasonally adjusted employment levels in Klamath County are 3.6% (+830 jobs) above levels in February 2020 before the onset of the pandemic.

Klamath County added 620 jobs in the past year (+2.7%). Notable private-sector job gains over the past year were seen in private education and health services (+130 jobs);



other services (+130 jobs); and leisure and hospitality (+90 jobs). In the public sector, government employment was up by 270 jobs over the year, with the largest gains taking place in local government (+250 jobs). Total nonfarm employment growth was moderated by losses in trade, transportation, and utilities (-60 jobs) and manufacturing (-50 jobs).

<u>Lake County</u>: The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate saw little to no movement in Lake County and remained unchanged at 5.2%—last February it was 6.3%. The unemployment rate was 4.2% in January 2020, before the impacts of COVID-19 were first felt.

Lake County employment increased by 50 jobs in February, with the only notable monthly gains in the public sector (+20 jobs). As of February 2024, seasonally adjusted total nonfarm employment levels remain 110 jobs (-4.6%) below the pre-pandemic February 2020 employment levels.

Lake County's total nonfarm employment is down by 30 jobs year-over-year. Gains were marginal with a gain of 10 jobs in each of the following industries: mining, logging, and construction; trade, transportation, and utilities; information; and private education and health services. These gains were overshadowed by losses in leisure and hospitality (-30 jobs), local government (-20 jobs), and manufacturing (-20 jobs). All other major industries saw little to no change over the year.

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Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
