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Employment in South Coast: March 2023 Leisure and Hospitality Job Gains Boost Employment Total

Coos County total payroll employment rose by 130 jobs in March. The largest employment increases were estimated in leisure and hospitality (+40), and private education and health services (+30). Government employment added 50 jobs over the month. Local government excluding education and tribal gained 40 jobs over the month. Both federal and state government employment climbed by 10. Local education employment slipped by 20 jobs.

Coos County payroll employment rose by 310 jobs over the past year. Gains were posted in transportation, warehousing, and utilities (+70); leisure and hospitality (+50); and manufacturing (+40). Industries with estimated job losses over the year were construction (-50), retail trade (-40), other services (-30), and financial activities (-20). Government employment climbed by 250 jobs with gains in local government excluding education and tribal (+110), Indian tribal (+90), and local government education (+30).

Curry County payroll employment gained 50 jobs in March. Leisure and hospitality (+30), and local government excluding education services (+20) showed employment gains over the month.

Over the past year, Curry County payroll employment fell by 50 jobs. Losses were estimated in leisure and hospitality (-110), financial activities (-20), and manufacturing (-20). A few industries added jobs since March 2022 including other services (+30), retail trade (+30), and health care (+20).

The Oregon Employment Department plans to release the April county and metropolitan area unemployment rates and employment survey data on Tuesday, May 23rd, and the statewide unemployment rate and employment survey data for April on Wednesday, May 17^{th.}

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
