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## **Employment in Tillamook County: October 2022**

### **Seasonally adjusted employment dropped by 40 in October**

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment decreased by 40 in October to 9,580 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to decrease by 110 jobs, but the county shed 150 jobs. The private sector lost 170 jobs, and total government employment rose by 20. The leisure and hospitality sector shed 140 jobs. Retail trade trimmed 20 jobs in October. Local government education added 20 jobs. Other industries had small changes.

October's total nonfarm employment numbers show a gain of 450 jobs compared with one year before, an increase of 4.9%. The county lost 1,520 jobs in April 2020 as the pandemic hit, and it has essentially returned to the same number of jobs it had in October 2019, before the pandemic. Some major industries gained jobs over the past year. Leisure and hospitality added 90 jobs. Trade, transportation, and utilities grew by 30 jobs. Local government education regained 260 jobs over the year. On the other hand, mining and logging cut 60 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.2% in October, essentially unchanged from 4.0% in September. It was 4.5% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.1% in October, and the national rate was 3.7%.

The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
