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Employment in Tillamook County: June 2024

Seasonally adjusted employment increased by 60 in June

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment increased by 60 in June to 9,710 jobs. Seasonally adjusted figures compare expected changes with actual changes. Employment was expected to increase by 180 jobs, and the county added 240 jobs. The private sector gained 230 jobs, and total government employment increased by 10. Leisure and hospitality added 140 jobs. Manufacturing added 50 jobs. Local government excluding education added 10 jobs.

June's total nonfarm employment was down from the previous year by 40 jobs, a decrease of 0.4%. Durable goods manufacturing gained 40 jobs over the past year. Leisure and hospitality gained 30 jobs. Private education and health services lost 90 jobs during the year. Government gained 70 jobs over the year.

Tillamook County's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.9% in June, down from 4.0% in May. It was 3.6% the year before. The statewide unemployment rate was 4.1% in June, and the national rate was 4.1%.

Nonfarm Payroll Employment: Data are by place of work and cover full- and part-time employees who worked or received pay for the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude the self-employed, volunteers, unpaid family workers, and domestics.

The Oregon Employment Department and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) work cooperatively to develop and publish monthly payroll employment and labor force data for Oregon's metropolitan areas and counties. The estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. The estimates of unemployment are based on a survey of households and other sources.

The Oregon Employment Department payroll employment estimates are revised quarterly using information from unemployment insurance tax records. All department publications use data from this *official Oregon series* unless noted.

The department also makes the BLS-produced nonfarm payroll employment series for metropolitan areas available. These are revised annually by BLS.
