




#### Overall jobs recovery is fast by historical standards




#### Lane County lost more jobs in the last two recessions







#### Oregon has more jobs now than before the pandemic recession




More than half (22) of all counties have regained their total pandemic recession job losses.


Near full jobs recovery (90% to 100%)



- Private education & health services (-5%), -1,600




# Unemployment is near record lows

#### Seasonally Adjusted Unemployment Rate






# 2023 saw fewer job vacancies, but still elevated





## Recent data shows a low jobseeker to vacancy ratio




Number of unemployed people per private job opening



#### Real wages at private employers have gone up to attract workers









#### When people switch jobs, they're getting higher wages






# Average wages are lower in Lane County






Total Employment vs. Health Care



- Public education



#### All major industries are projected to add jobs over 10 years


#### Projected Employment Change, 2022-2032





#### The vast majority of job openings are due to replacement










#### Housing construction lags population growth in recent years






#### Lane County's workforce is less racially diverse than the nation's
