

Employment Department

Oregon has more jobs now than before the pandemic recession.



Twenty-one counties have regained their total pandemic recession job losses.

Recovery has been a bit slower in Southern Oregon.

Key Facts from Recent News Release

Oregon's unemployment rate dropped to 3.7% in May, down from 4.0% in April.


- The U.S. unemployment rate was also 3.7% in May.
- The size of Oregon's labor force was about 14,000 less than one year ago.
- Nonfarm payroll employment increased by 3,600 jobs in May.
 - Monthly gains were largest in financial activities (+1,200 jobs).
 - Leisure and hospitality added 1,100 jobs over the month.
 - Job losses in May were largest in retail trade (-500 jobs) and government (-300 jobs).

Employers added 39,100 jobs to nonfarm payrolls over the past year, a growth rate of 2.0%.



Unemployment rate fell back to match the U.S. level in May.



Although Oregon now has around 14 unemployed people for every 10 vacancies, there are still few unemployed people historically.





The April unemployment rate for men was higher than for women in Oregon.




Average unemployment rates declined for all age groups in 2022, except those age 16 to 24.



Average Annual Unemployment by Age Category




Payroll employment has grown moderately (2% OTY), and self employment has declined.

Vacancies decreased 13% from the fall and decreased 25% from winter 2022. Employers reported difficulty filling 63% of winter 2023 vacancies.


The average starting wage among this group of vacancies was \$24.41 per hour, an inflationadjusted increase of 14.6% from winter 2022, but only 0.2% above fall 2022.

A typical job vacancy tends to be for a full-time, permanent position. Two out of five openings required education beyond high school.

As vacancies dropped in the winter, the unemployed to job vacancy ratio increased.



Oregon's unemployed-to-vacancy ratio has been below pre-pandemic levels for the past two years.

The U.S. ratio was 0.7 in January 2023, its seventh straight quarter below 1. It reached 4.3 in April 2020 after several years around 1-to-1.


Oregon had 1.4 unemployed per job vacancy in winter 2023, up from 0.9 in winter 2022 but still much lower than the peak of 5.7 in May 2020.




The region as a whole has recovered to its pre-pandemic level of employment, though slightly below its all time peak.



NWO up 2,630 jobs OTY, and 1,260 since December. A little over 2%/year.


Over-the-Year Change in SA Nonfarm Payroll Employment, May 2023





Most counties lost some Mfg. and Finance jobs. Only Lincoln lost in Trade, etc.


NWO Over-the-Year Employment Change to May 2023





Clatsop County Population




Clatsop County added 289 residents in the year to July 2022.

From 2012 to 2022 the share of the population ages 18-64 fell from 61.7% to 57.7%. The age 65+ group's share rose from 17.9% to 25.2%.

The lower participation rate has taken about 2,400 out of the labor force since 2009.



The Clatsop County labor force in 2022 was 19,645. That is 1,014 fewer than in 2009.



As usual, substantial growth was in unincorporated areas.

Clatsop County Population Change, 2020-2022






Clatsop County Annual Employment Change to May 2023
